






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The Seerah A Beacon Light for All


great Imam and judge of Al-Masjid An-Nabawi, who pronounced justice, without distinguishing between strong and weak is a worthwhile lesson.


In a nutshell, there remains no facet of life which has not been covered by the noble life of Rasulullah ## and in which there is not a beautiful example to follow.

mnesty International has announced it has withdrawn ts highest honour from Myanmar leader Aung San Suu Kyi.


The organisation says it wrote to Suu Kyi on Sunday informing her that she had been stripped of the 2009 Ambassador of Conscience

Amnesty International says Suu Kyi had not used her political and moral authority to safeguard human rights, justice or equality in Myanmar citing her apparent indifference to atrocities committed by the Myanmar military and increasing intolerance of freedom of expression.

'Defending the indefensible': Malaysia's Mahathir slams Aung San Suu Kyi over Rohingya crisis

INGAPORE: Aung San Suu Kyi's response to the alleged atrocities against Myanmar's minority Rohingya community is "indefensible", said Malaysian Prime Minister Mahathir Mohamad on Tuesday (Nov 13) in a withering criticism of the Nobel Peace Prize laureate.

Mahathir, 93, said he was "very disappointed" by Aung San Suu Kyi's failure to defend the Rohingya, a stateless Muslim minority driven from Myanmar in their hundreds of thousands last year by an army

campaign that UN investigators said amounted to genocide.

"Someone who has been detained before should know the sufferings and should not inflict it on the hapless," said Mahathir, in a reference to Aung San Suu Kyi's long years of house arrest under Myanmar's military rule.

"But it would seem that Aung San Suu Kyi is trying to defend what is indefensible," he told reporters. "They are actually oppressing these people to the point of killing them, mass killing.

Medication pick up programme cuts hospital queues

OUTH AFRICA - Health MEC Sibongiseni Dhlomo has lauded the Central Chronic Medicine Dispensation and Distribution (CCMDD) programme for reducing congested queues at healthcare facilities.

According to Dhlomo, there are less than 17 million people in the province who are now collecting their chronic medication closer to their homes, without having to spend money on transport fare or waking up very early to stand in long queues at congested healthcare facilities. Since the launch of the programme in 2014, 4557 chronic medication pick-up points have been established across the province.

"We are very pleased with the success of this programme. It means that our fellow compatriots who are hypertensive, diabetic, or those who have arthritis, HIV and other ailments only have to come to a health facility once every three months to collect their medicine. Otherwise they fetch it closer to their homes, at libraries, community halls, tribal courts and other local amenities. The medication is pre-packaged and all looks the same, which helps eliminate stigma because no-one can tell what the medication is for," said Dhlomo.



Cases of infidelity and illicit affairs are encountered by the Social Department on a regular basis. There seems to be a frightening trend among people to pander to their shahawaat (base desires) without fear for its repercussions. The slightest opportunity to indulge sways a person from chastity and purity to immorality and shame. It is astonishing to what length people will go to entertain the call of an illicit lover.

Muslims are urged to take heed of the following:

- Do not venture anywhere near zina (promiscuity or fornication). This entails protecting all the limbs of the body including the heart and mind from filthy thoughts, actions and engagements.
- Lower one's gaze in a deliberate and unapologetic manner.
 Convey the message of chastity.
- Guard one's self, one's spouse and children from places of promiscuity and unsupervised usage of technology that could cause one to succumb to this dangerous scourge.
- Make constant Dua for protection from all vices. "O Allah, purify my heart & keep my private organs chaste from sin".

Suicide

The Needless Loss of Life

t is that time of the year when the incidents of suicide increase, unfortunately suicide deaths in the Muslim community are becoming common. The loss of human life is always tragic, but when it is needless and self-inflicted then the pain and loss is compounded. Statistics about suicide show an alarming growth rate every year, with some reports showing upto 60% increase.

It is inevitable that in life one will encounter challenges and difficulty at some point or the other. No matter how enormous the challenge of life may seem to be, it will never be beyond one's capacity to bear it with patience. The Quran says "Allah does not burden a soul more than it is capable of enduring" (Surah Al-Baqarah)

Those inclined to suicide believe that a quick way to dispense of life's hurdles is to resort to suicide. Generally, people who have lost all hope in life, or have underachieved in some task they expected to be successful in, turn to suicide and consider it to be a relief from their perceived 'failure' or the 'indignity' that comes with it.

In reality, suicide does not give relief - rather it brings loss and regret. Embracing challenges with patience and fortitude will bring relief and consolation for us from Allah. The Quran says "Verily with every difficulty there is relief". This verse is repeated in Surah Inshirah for emphasis.

Almighty Allah is our Creator, He gives life and owns it, and He alone has the right to end it. Suicide is forbidden in Islam and listed among the major sins. There are specific

sanctions mentioned in the Quran prohibiting self-killing. Allah says in the Quran, "And do not kill yourselves. Surely, Allah is Most Merciful to you." (Surah An-Nisa)

Hazrat Abu Hurairah anarrated that the Prophet said: "Whoever throws himself down from a mountain and kills himself will be in the Fire of Hell, throwing himself down therein forever. Whoever takes poison and kills himself, his poison will be in his hand and he will be sipping it in the Fire of Hell forever. Whoever kills himself with a piece of iron, that piece of iron will be in his hand and he will be stabbing himself in the stomach with it in the Fire of Hell, forever." (Sahih Bukhari)

Hazrat Thabit bin Dahak an arrates that the Prophet said: "Whoever kills himself with something in this world will be punished with it on the Day of Resurrection." (Sahih Bukhari)

What to do if you are suicidal:

- Think deeply about one's Creator, family, teachers and well-wishers
 turn to Allah and seek His assistance.
- Talk to Ulama, scholars, and reputable social workers who are able to help in combating negative thoughts.
- Join support groups that provide useful assistance for those potentially suicidal.
- Seek medical assistance from a professional.

May Allah save us from all harm and give us eternal bliss and peace.

A husband's common dilemma

Question

There's a bitter relationship between mother in law and wife. Most of the times mother's approach creates the friction. The son sometimes tries to advise with wife and mother regarding the issue. At the same time the son also wants to maintain his wife's Islamic rights and harmony in the marriage. What should the husband do?


Answer

The husband should avoid engaging in the matter. He should listen to the wife her side and pacify her but do not take any position. Similarly, listen to his mother and be respectful and attentive to her but not take her side. He should remain neutral but show both of them separately that he cares and is concerned. Praise the wife privately for her good qualities and support and encourage her to good character, patience and Dua. Reassure his mother of his respect, concern and commitment towards her as a son and encourage her to make Dua for him and for happiness. Keep some useful literature around the house that they may pick up and read. The husband should not react emotionally to any situation or make any statement that will create disharmony. Husband should give Sadaqah daily, make abundant Dua and join the company of a reputable Shaykh/mentor/Alim to gain ongoing guidance in the matter.

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
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
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
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


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Interview with Nigerian Alim Maulana Maroof

What is the population of Muslims in Nigeria?

Nigeria has a population of 180 million of which 50% are Muslims. There are 250 spoken languages with 3 main languages.

Give us some history of Nigeria?

Before colonization Nigeria was under an Islamic Khilafa under the leadership of Sheikh Usman dan Fodio known as the Sokoto Khilafa. The Khilafa linked over 30 different emirates and over 10 million people in the most powerful state in its region and one of the most significant empires in Africa in the nineteenth century. Sheikh Usman dan Fodio was a contemporary of Shah Waliyullah Rahimahullah - demise 1799. the British defeated the Khilafat in 1903 and colonized the region.

How many Islamic Institutes and Masjids are there?

100 000 Masjids - 40 Universities - most Ulama graduate from Arab countries.

what is the staple food in Nigeria and main work?

Rice & meat. Most people are skilled workers, artisans, manufacturers - the wealthiest man in Africa is a Nigerian.

Are Muslims involved in the country's politics?

Yes, the President is a Muslim -Muslims are actively involved in civil structures.

What is state of basic in education?

Weak in many parts of Nigeria - Maktabs and basic Islamic education is not attached to Masjids.

What are some of the challenges for Muslims?

Intimidation from other faith groups, strong negative media influence, youth not really Islamically inclined youth are often influenced by drugs.

Excellence of the Noble Family & Companions of Nabi

Hazrat Abbas ibn Abdil Muttalib

Name: Abbas ibn Abdil Muttalib

Title: Abul Fadl

Birth: 2 years before the year of the elephants

Demise: 12 Rajab 32 A.H. aged 88 - buried in Jannatul Baqee

Hazrat Abbas \clubsuit was the paternal uncle of Rasulullah # and was 2 years elder in age. Once someone asked him, "Are you older or is Nabi # older?" He replied, "I am older in age but he is greater in stature."

His father was Abdul Muttalib. His mother was a lady from Namr bin Qasit tribe. She was the first Arab woman to drape the Ka'bah with a silk cloth. The reason was that Hazrat Abbas & got lost when he was a child and she made a Nazr (vow) that if she finds him she will drape the Ka'bah with silk. When Abbas & was found, she fulfilled her Nazr.

Virtues

- 1. Hazrat Abbas 🐗 was a leader in Makkah in the pre Islamic era. His responsibility was maintenance of Musjidul Haraam and providing water for the Hajees (pilgrims).
- 2. He accepted Islam in its early stages and concealed it. He was forced to participate in the battle of Badr on the side of the Mushrikeen. Nabi $\frac{1}{8}$ said, "Whoever meets Hazrat Abbas $\frac{1}{8}$ should not kill him. He has been forced to come out." Abul Yusr Ka'b ibn Umar captured him. He ransomed himself and returned to Makkah. Then he made Hijrat to Madinah Munawwarah after some time.
- 3. A large number of Ahadith are narrated from him.
- 4. Mujahid (R) says, "Hazrat Abbas & set free 70 slaves at the time of his death."
- 5. Hazrat Abdul Muttalib ibn Harith ibn Abdil Muttalib 🎄 narrates in a lengthy Hadith that Rasulullah 🕷 said, "...O People! Whoever harms my uncle harms me. The uncle of a man is in the rank of the father." (Tirmizi)

Hazrat Abdullah bin Mughaffal & narrates that Rasulullah & said: "(Fear) Allah, (fear) Allah regarding my Sahabah. (Fear) Allah, (fear) Allah regarding my Sahabah. Do not make them a target of criticism after me. Whoever loves them, it is based on love for me that he loves them. Whoever hates them, it is based on hatred for me that he hates them. Whoever harms them, harms me. Whoever harms me, harms Allah. Whoever harms Allah, very soon Allah will seize (punish) him". (Mishkat)

Cleaning the rust

ayyiduna 'Abdullah ibn 'Umar reports that Rasulullah said: "Indeed the hearts rust just as iron does."

The Sahabah & asked: "What is its polish?"

Rasulullah # replied: "Abundant remembrance of death and recitation of the Quran"

(Shu'abul Iman, hadith: 1859 & Musnad al-Shihab, hadith: 1179)

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
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
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Q&A

: Is it permissible for Muslims to make purchases or sell items on what is known as 'Black Friday Sales'?

: It appears that the concept of "Black Friday" is purely a business marketing concept and has no pronounced connection with any religion or religious practice. As such, it would be deemed permissible for Muslims to trade in and benefit from such promotions.

uslims should however bear in mind that making purchases and taking advantage of promotions and sale items should be done according to need and with moderation. One should exercise caution and avoid wasting time in frivolity of the market place and impulsive buying of goods one does not require based on availability and greed.

: What is the ruling with regards to having Christmas decorations, Santa and Elves etc. in my store? It is just to create a theme.

: This must be avoided by Muslims. Though it may appear nowadays merely as a theme but such displays do have religious connotations with festivities of other faiths. Muslim traders should try to maintain a

distinct identity.

: I have just recently heard that if I give my zakat to a registered organisation who issues a section 18A tax certificate I can claim back a portion of the zakat paid in my tax returns. Is this permissible?

: It is permissible to use the 18A tax certificate and claim a refund or rebate on the taxes one has paid or will pay. One's Zakat is discharged as the recipients have received the Zakat in full.

he refund or allowable deduction from government granted to the taxpayer is considered to be a lowering of his/her the income tax and generally has nothing to do with one's Zakaatable calculation, distribution nor is it a return of ones' Zakat.

he above is not an endorsement of organizations that provide '18A' tax certificates. One must ensure that the organization one has entrusted to distribute one's Zakat is credible and has discharged one's Zakat correctly in terms of Shariah under the guidance of experienced Ulama.

: Kindly advise on activities and chores for children in the holidays to help keep them occupied?

: Parents should plan the time and activities of their **L**children in the holiday constructively. The routine should be a mix of spiritual obligations and exercises, fun, character building and development. Time should be allocated for them to do some household chores (making the bed, tidying the room and cupboards, etc.) to help them appreciate the luxuries they enjoy. Gardening and other such recreational activities may also be considered. The key is to avoid them being idle or involved in wrong doing or joining wrong company. Programs held by reputable organizations that will help to orientate them to develop themselves holistically should also be considered.

: What is the Islamic ruling on hitting children to discipline them?

A: Islam requires one to be kind and affectionate towards children and at the same time also requires one to bring one's children up with the correct values. Islam also recognizes the fact that sometimes children may need to be firmly disciplined in order to inculcate in them the correct values. However, such disciplining is strictly regulated and physically abusing and maiming the child is prohibited. If a child has become very rebellious and refuses to abide then as a last resort and within the required guidelines, a degree of light physical discipline maybe administered. This is merely to instil the seriousness of the situation and not to inflict pain o harm to the child. Nonetheless, whilst this maybe permissible it is still best and advisable to avoid and seek other measures of discipline.

ccordingly, parents and guardians should adopt a gradual method in disciplining their children. For example, a parent is to encourage his/her child towards Salah from the age of 7 which is much younger than the age at which Salah becomes obligatory. Should this method be adopted correctly the child would be in the habit of Salah well in advance and the need for disciplining through other means should not arise. Hence, the child should be encouraged and guided with kindness, affection and wisdom towards these values.

otwithstanding this, when the child remains disobedient, Islam recognizes the need to inculcate more stringent disciplinary measures when required for the long term benefit of the child. If the child is allowed to remain stubborn and rebellious this condition will grow with him and adversely affect him and others in future. It is in this regard that the Hadith states, "Command your children to perform Salah when they are 7, and spank them if they do not perform it when they are 10." (Al-Musannaf ibn-Abi Shaybah #3500)

owever, such spanking is strictly regulated by the Jurists as follows,

The time of spanking children has long gone. The effects of hitting children are not positive. As a result, the child could become obstinate and fearless. A child may be spanked with an open hand, not with a stick, not more than thrice (such as three slaps on the back). Only so much force may be exerted which the child will be able to bear (i.e. it should not bruise the child or leave marks on his body). The child must not be hit on the face or head. Anything beyond this is not permissible, otherwise the child will be allowed to take retribution on the Day of Judgement. Children should be treated with kindness and affection." (Adapted from Fataawa Mahmoodiyah v.20 p.306 compilation of the Fatawa of the Late Grand Mufti of India, Mufti Mahmood Hasan Gangohi (Rahimahullah).

Based on the above, it is clear that one should endeavour to discipline one's children through all means other than spanking. In fact, if a child is not brought up correctly, spanking the child may very well make the child more stubborn and obstinate.

ence, one should strive to earn respect and obedience by becoming true role models and through love and affection and avoid inflicting physical disciplinary steps upon children in one's care. Bringing up children is a discipline and so long as one fulfils one's responsibility correctly, there will hardly be the need to hit or spank children.

The entire blanket distribution campaign was coordinated by Maulana M S Ravat from centre's office in Johannesburg.


Distribution of blankets was facilitated through volunteers and organisations in the following areas:

ouseholds in Phoenix and surrounding areas are affected by many social conditions which impact negatively on their lives. One among the many challenges experienced is massive unemployment which has resulted is not only poverty but a desperate need for even a single meal for the day.

At certain areas of Phoenix like the Sunford, people arrive early in the morning and wait along the streets for potential employers who might offer work - even if it is just for a few hours or a day.

Getting up very early in the morning and arriving at such places on foot is not only an ordeal for them but to wait for the remote possibility of work for just a day - especially on an empty stomach - is overwhelming.

To help this situation, Darul Ihsan Humanitarian Centre's Phoenix office has been providing packed meals for up to 50 recipients a day -

standing along streets seeking jobs - seven days a week.

A grateful recipient expressed himself as follows:

"Often we wait to find some sort of employment on the streets without much hope. Thanks to Darul Ihsan, at least we know that we will not be hungry for the day."

Welfare Department of Darul Ihsan strives to serve those in need

Poverty, harsh economic conditions and a high rate of unemployment is making extremely difficult for households to survive. Families are finding extreme difficulty to meet their daily needs of food, rental, utilities, medical expenses, transport, school fees, frail care, clothing, stationery, etc. The list goes on.

The Welfare Department of Darul Ihsan, through its various upliftment projects and services strives to address the immediate needs of families encountering difficulties.

The Welfare Department also assists in empowering individuals who are enterprising but do not have the means to start off their work.

Recently a self-employed person who was in a dilemma was assisted to regain ability to earn. His story is one of courage and inspiration.

Abdullah (name changed), a respected indigenous Muslim (30), married with two children (5 & 8 years old), lost his only means of income to support his family. Abdullah, who has a Professional Driving Permit (PDP), is registered to a location-based app that allows him to be a hire on-demand private driver.

After a struggle he managed to raise the required deposit to hire a

vehicle from a company and was able to support his family through this income. Regrettably, after being involved in a motor vehicle collision he was blocked by the company to hire another vehicle resulting in him being unemployed.

He then approached the Darul Ihsan Welfare Department for assistance to travel to Pretoria and approach the head office of the vehicle hire company to appeal his case to be reregistered and be able to hire a vehicle once again.

Alhamdulillah, Abdullah's appeal was successful, but he was unable to raise the deposit to hire another vehicle. The Welfare Department assisted him with the deposit required for another vehicle and Abdullah is once again able to earn a living and support his family.

During his rounds in the Sea Cow Lake area Abdullah is often met by the Welfare Department staff for Salah at Masjid Taqwa.

He expresses his gratitude to the organisation and its well-wishers:

"Alhamdulillah, the Welfare Department has made it possible for me to be able to earn an honest living and support my family with dignity."


